Welcome to East Anglian Air Ambulance's (EAAA) Impact Report 2022 – 2023.

This has been a year of growing and adapting as we continue to do the very best for the communities we serve. We are one year into our five-year strategy and I am immensely proud and humbled by everyone going above and beyond in what is an ever-changing landscape.

By most measures, EAAA has had its busiest year ever. We have undertaken more night missions, treated more patients, trained more members of the community in life-saving skills and forged ahead in our research and audit activities.

It's you, EAAA patients, supporters, donors, families, communities and volunteers who remain the driving force behind all that we do, and your achievements are nothing short of incredible. I'm pleased to be able to share some of these in this report.

By being prudent and careful with our expenditure, we spent less than we planned this year. However, with a total expenditure of £16.7m, the cost of delivering our service in 2022-23 was still 7% higher than last year. Rising costs are affecting the whole East Anglian community and more local people than ever need our help, but you have once again inspired us with your kindness and generosity.

Together, you have raised an incredible £18.6m, providing 24/7 critical care for local people and generating a surplus which will be responsibly invested to



further improve our service and ensure that we can be there for you and your loved ones long into the future.

This year's EAAA Impact Report explores the moments before, during and after life-threatening emergencies - because your impact doesn't start or end at the scene of a medical incident. Aftercare support, research, education and teaching life-saving skills in the community are all central to our life-saving strategy and are just some of the ways we save lives together.

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Our strategy to save lives.

Goal one

Deliver outstanding 24/7 out-of-hospital critical care

With an outstanding team, cutting-edge tools and infrastructure, and through sustainable income, we will deliver the very best out-of-hospital critical care to our patients.

Goal two

Help patients and families during their recovery

Through advice, signposting and the opportunity to meet the crew, we will provide aftercare and support following an accident or incident which our crews attended to help aid recovery.

Goal three

Educate and raise awareness of life-saving skills in the community

We are committed to improving the likelihood of good patient outcomes before our crews arrive on scene through CPR and defibrillator training. We aim to train 20,000 people per year by 2027.

Goal four

Plan and conduct research to advance out-of-hospital critical care

Using the latest evidence behind cuttingedge out-of-hospital critical care, we aim to continually improve our service through the development of new treatments, equipment, and skills.

Goal five

(ollaborate and develop mutually beneficial partnerships

Only together can we develop and deliver this local life-saving service. Through partnership working with our aviation partners, East of England Ambulance Service Trust and other emergency services, neighbouring air ambulances and other charities, we will optimise out-of-hospital critical care in East Anglia.

Goal six

Protect and enhance EAAA's reputation

Our reputation is the foundation upon which everything is built. Through integrity, good governance and excellence in all we do, we will give everyone the best possible chance of surviving and recovering from a life-threatening emergency in East Anglia.

You are empowering communities.

In 2022-23, one in four of the medical emergencies to which we were tasked were cardiac arrests.

In these situations, early intervention is vital to the patient's chances of survival and recovery. We aim to ensure local people suffering an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest receive quality early CPR to provide the best possible patient outcome. Our community training programme provides the public with life-saving skills and confidence to act when every second counts.

During this period, according to figures from the Resuscitation Council, the East of England has a 66% rate of bystanders performing CPR, which is 23% above the national average and also 11% up for this region compared to 12 months ago.

This year we had the immeasurable pleasure of meeting four local people whose lives were saved by the fast action of bystanders trained by EAAA's team. Thanks to your support, more people in our region are equipped with the skills to save a life, ultimately helping more local families to stay together.

We have seen incredible support from people in the community who continue to go above and beyond to fundraise, volunteer their time, take part in events and be an ambassador for EAAA.

Over 250 EAAA volunteers donated 10,000 hours of their time to support the charity last year. That time is the equivalent cost of nearly £150,000 or 38 life-saving missions.

Our fantastic EAAA lottery players have collectively contributed nearly £7m to our income last year. That's over a third of the total amount we need to develop and deliver our life-saving service.

For the second year running, one in three emergency responses was made possible by supporters who left gifts in their Wills to EAAA, an incredible testament to their generosity of spirit. It is very satisfying to know that every penny raised is going towards saving another life.

Income from Trusts and Foundations enabled our Operations Team to maintain an 'Emergency Equipment Fund' to swiftly replace damaged or faulty equipment and maintain our full service.

Vital projects such as 'Blood on Board' and the purchase of new Rapid Response Vehicles were made possible through generous individual donations. Our regular donors – including our amazing Navigator supporters who each donate the cost of at least one mission each year – collectively funded over 180 callouts.
