

Technology has played a major role in allowing us to progress beyond just transporting the patient to hospital as quickly as possible. Now, we are able to start critical care interventions at the scene, so that patients have an even greater chance at survival.

From roadside surgical procedures, to resuscitating a patient in cardiac arrest to administering an emergency anaesthetic to protect a patient's airway and brain, our teams can do so much for the patient at the scene and en-route to hospital.

As technology continues to evolve, we want to be able to continue to offer these improvements to our patients. For example, the innovative Butterfly iQ point-of-care ultrasound machine, a handheld whole-body scanner that displays high-quality ultrasound images onto a smartphone or tablet, is helping our crews to reach an accurate diagnosis even quicker at the scene of an emergency.



Having the ability to perform a thorough assessment of the patient at this stage gives us the ability to make on-the-spot decisions about the best course of treatment and start administering it while getting the patient to the best hospital to continue their care.

We know that technology will continue to evolve, making what we may once have never imagined possible a reality.

A gift of hope for those who need us

Our Mission is to provide the best possible outcomes for people unfortunate enough to be involved in serious accidents or medical emergencies. The combination of a quick response time, advanced critical care on scene, and rapid transfer can be vital in saving lives and can greatly improve a patient's prospects of making a full recovery.

In Paul Shattock's case, the charity was able to be there for him twice, within just two weeks. Paul suffered two cardiac arrests at his home in Fakenham. Both times his wife, Jill, found him and performed CPR until help arrived. Both times Paul benefitted from the enhanced



care that our team can provide on scene. Both times he was flown from Fakenham to the specialist cardiac centre at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. Luckily for Paul and his family, he has gone on to make a fantastic recovery and hasn't required EAAA's help since!

Our motivation comes from a determination and passion to provide the best possible outcomes for patients. For people like Paul.



Our journey together

Who could have imagined when we first formed the charity in 2000, that we would evolve so quicky? We soon went from being a flying road ambulance, operating one helicopter with a paramedic onboard, just one day a week, to being able to take the latest life-saving technology and advanced critical care to the patient, 365 days of the year.

Today we have two specialist doctor and paramedic teams covering the region every day, one based in Norwich and one in Cambridge, who deliver critical care 24/7, by either rapid response vehicle or by helicopter. Each of our helicopters are operated by two highly-skilled pilots, who make sure the medical teams get to the patient as quicky and safely as possible, especially at night when landings are more difficult.

We are tasked, on average, eight times a day and by the end of 2020, we had attended over 30,000 life-saving missions.

When we first began flying, we mostly attended road traffic accidents. Today, we respond to more medical emergencies out in the community, such as cardiac arrests, than we do car accidents.

In the next 5-10 years we want to see an increased number of survivors from out of hospital cardiac arrest.

At present, the UK has a low survival rate - less than 10% - for cardiac arrests that occur out of hospital. We are currently looking at treatments only available in hospitals to see how we can deliver them in a pre-hospital environment, to increase these survival rates.

If we can get patients whose heart has stopped working onto a specialist device that effectively replaces the job of the heart and lungs, this could keep them alive until we can get them to a hospital. That would give them a better chance of survival, giving the hospital time to fix the problem and allow the heart to recover. A gift of vital care for your community.

With these medical emergencies being the biggest part of our work, we want to deliver cutting edge treatments on-scene.

The Butterfly iQ ultrasound is a great example of how the latest technology can take us one step closer to significantly improving survival rates. This piece of equipment enables our medics to make a faster and more accurate diagnosis. With over 30,000* people a year suffering from out of hospital cardiac arrests in the UK, it's important that we can embrace any future technological developments to ensure better patient outcomes.

HOW TO LEAVE AN AMAZING LEGACY

"Your legacy is someone's future"

You may find this information helpful if you are considering leaving a lasting legacy to East Anglian Air Ambulance (EAAA).

By leaving a gift in your Will to EAAA, you will be part of a vital group of people who help fund almost one in four of our missions. It's a special life-saving gift to future generations. **Thank you.**



A gift share of your estate (residuary gift)

This gift is a percentage of whatever is left over from your estate, after any cash and/or specific gifts have been made and administration fees have been paid. By leaving just 1% means you still have 99% to share between loved ones.

Cash gift (pecuniary gift)

This gift is a fixed sum of money. It's worth bearing in mind that inflation will affect its value over time, and so you can ask that it rises in line with inflation if you would like to avoid this.

Specific gift

This is a specific item like jewellery, a car, or an asset, like shares.



You may already have a solicitor who deals with your affairs or if you'd like to find a local solicitor in your area who specialises in Will writing, visit: lawsociety.org.uk. Alternatively, you can find a professional Will writer on ipw.org.uk. They will usually offer to store your Will for you, alternatively you can store it with the Probate Service (England and Wales).

Choosing an Executor

Your executors will be responsible for carrying out the wishes in your Will and settle any debts or tax you owe, from your estate.

Anyone over the age of 18 can be an executor, including people who are set to benefit from your Will (although beneficiaries cannot witness your Will). This can be quite a time-consuming job, so we recommend that you ask someone first before naming them as an executor in your Will.

You can instruct a professional executor, such as your solicitor or accountant. It would be advisable to discuss any fees associated with this before appointing them.

Inheritance Tax

Gifts in Wills to a charity are tax free, so can help reduce any tax bill or rule one out. If you think inheritance tax could apply to you, it is important to seek advice from a professional so they can tell you the best and most tax efficient way to write your Will.

Adding EAAA to your Will

If you already have a Will, you can make amendments using a Codicil.

This is a simple legal document that alters or adds to an existing Will. This can be helpful if you want to add new family members or leave gifts to charities, but it's better to write a new Will for larger changes. If you have any questions about writing a Codicil or updating your Will, you should seek advice from a qualified professional, such as a solicitor.

Suggested wording for your Will

Small errors can create confusion and potentially delays in having your wishes carried out.

If you would like to include EAAA in your Will, then it's important that our name, address and charity number are correct. Here's an example some wording you could use:
