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WELCOME to another festive lift Off

s it really time for another issue of Lift Off? As the nights draw in and we get ever closer to Christmas, it must be! I'm Doctor Pam Chrispin and I'm the Deputy Medical Director here at EAAA.

At this time of year it always dawns on me how important it is that we're able to operate in the dark, flying to unlit sites, which we can only do thanks to the expert skill of our fantastic pilots who are trained in flying with high-tech night vision goggles. We operate 365 days a year, and currently fly until 1:30am from our Cambridge base. Hopefully, with your continued support, we'll be flying 24/7 from Norwich this time next year – and in the winter months we'll be doing more flying in darkness than daylight! But it's essential for the people of East Anglia that we do; and can respond by helicopter or rapid response vehicle (RRV) when we're needed.

I've been flying for the charity since 2008 and currently complete, on average, eight shifts a month. My main role is supporting and training my medical colleagues and I get quite involved in inducting our new cohort of doctors (who you can meet on page 13). I've seen so many changes at EAAA; the



introduction of new pieces of kit, bigger, more sophisticated aircraft and night flying. I'm really looking forward to seeing what 2020 brings for EAAA as we celebrate 20 years of saving lives!

AWARDS & NOMINATIONS.

t's been a busy – as ever – year at EAAA, as we push forward with plans to become a 24/7 helicopter emergency medical service. We're pleased to say all this activity – made possible with your support – has been noticed in award nominations and wins.



In September, a team from Anglia Two were honoured to receive the BBC Three Counties 999 Award for their attendance at a multi vehicle car crash in Stevenage in July, where several pedestrians were injured. Being the only air ambulance in the region to fly at night, we were the only response team to fly to the scene, landing on Stevenage Football Club's pitch. Doctor David Clutton, Pilot Dan Mansell and Critical Care Paramedic Nigel Strange (pictured) were part of the team that night and attended the awards in Dunstable.

It's an exciting time for our Norwich operation. As we're going to press, we're finalising our plans to move out of Hangar E, Gambling Close, in early 2020 while we start the works on extending and renovating our Norwich base. When completed, this will allow us to fly 24/7 from Norwich.

We will update you when we have moved, but if you are planning to pop in and see us in Norwich in early 2020, visit our website or phone us to check the address.

As we go to print, we're looking forward to November where we will find out if we're lucky enough to win a AAA Award – which stands for the Association of Air Ambulances. We're nominated for Campaign of the Year (Mission 24/7), Paramedic of the Year (Chris Neil), Special Incident (patient Thomas Port, who was injured by a rotavator in his garden) and Outstanding Young Person of the Year, which sees Eliza and Leo McQueen nominated for their work on the McQueen Charter, an initiative which supports mental heath in our sector.

DON'T MISS EMERGENCY HELICOPTER MEDICS



SERIES 3 SUNDAYS AT 9PM ON MORE4

If you're an avid watcher of EAAA in Emergency Helicopter Medics, then we hope you will have already spotted that there's a brand new series out! If you've missed it, you can quickly get up to date online as the new episodes just started airing on Sunday 10 November.

Over the ten new episodes, you will be able to get to know our crew better and see the types of emergencies they – and our counterparts at Great North Air Ambulance and Thames Valley Air Ambulance – are faced with on a daily basis. And, most importantly, how your donations are helping to save lives.

For EAAA's part in the show, two camera men filmed from both the Norwich and Cambridge base this summer to capture the real-life footage you will see. All the hot weather we had made for beautiful flying conditions, so hopefully you will spot a few local landmarks from Anglia One or Two!

For the series as a whole, between the three air ambulance charities the camera crew took off on 233 missions and filmed over 1,600 hours of footage in total.

On average, each episode pulls in over 500,000 viewers(!) and we hope you will be watching to learn a bit more about what it's like for our pilots, doctors and critical care paramedics when the red phone rings...

We can't reveal anything about the series, but hopefully you will have seen a few of the crew on the show so far, like Critical Care Paramedic Chris Neil; pictured below behind the scenes at his follow up TV interview for the series.

On Sunday 8 September we held our very first Trek 24 sponsored walk along the beautiful north Norfolk coast.

Taking in the stunning Norfolk coastline, over 200 people took part. 123 people braved the longer 24 mile walk from West Runton to Holkham Hall and 90 people completed the 24K route, from Cley to Holkham Hall.

The EAAA Trekkers, including several former patients and EAAA staff, were blessed with a bright sunny day with a refreshing cool breeze. The walkers were kept well energised and motivated by volunteers at several cheer and refreshment points along the way, with a hot meal waiting for them at the finish line.

Together, they raised a staggering £100,000 towards the additional £1 million we will need to raise each year to go 24/7 in order to develop and deliver a 24 hour helicopter emergency service. A huge thank you to everyone who took part and helped to make this event possible.

Look out for it again next year!













VOLUNTEERING. Be the difference

huge thank you to all the volunteers who have helped EAAA this autumn. 40 wonderful volunteers helped us at our flagship Trek 24 event on Sunday 8 September making our first ever coastal walk fundraising event a huge success. 
In the last issue of Liftoff we introduced you to Alison Brett (second from left), our Head of Aftercare, who has been doing an amazing job reaching out to our patients. Alison has now grown her team and we're very pleased to have three NHS nurses seconded to us as Clinical Liaison Officers, working in different parts of the region.

Introducing the rest of the team from above; Sue Gee (*left*), is a Coronary Care Nurse at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital and works with our patients in Norfolk; Lisa Boyle, a Clinical Nurse Specialist in the community, is working with our Suffolk-based patients and Georgie Sellick (*right*), Sister at the Neuro Critical Care Unit at Addenbrooke's, is working with our patients in Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire.

Our Aftercare service aims to:

- Support patients and their families in understanding the treatment received from our crew
- Explain complex clinical information to patients to help aid recovery
- Improve the quality of the aftercare we deliver, including more visits in hospital and the patient's home
- Organise and host patient base visits to meet the crew who treated them
- Signpost patients and families to local support networks
- Provide patient outcome feedback to EAAA clinicians

Because of the growing team, we've seen a 25% increase in the number of patients who have reached out to us or received aftercare support.



HOW THE AFTERCARE TEAM HELPED JACK

ack is eight years old and organised a sponsored walk for EAAA. The Anglia Two crew attended Jack's dad, Stefan, aged 58 in April. He had a cardiac arrest at home and sadly passed away.

Lisa from our Aftercare team visited Jack's mum, Wendy, at home to talk about what happened and Jack's sponsored walk idea. With support from his family, school, Lisa from the Aftercare team and Ben Walker from our Fundraising team; Jack organised a wonderful event on 9 July where he raised £3,720 in memory of his dad.

A few months later, Lisa arranged for Wendy and Jack to meet the crew who attended Jack's dad. The family, including Wendy's parents, met Doctor Natalie Lonsdale and one of the pilots, Dan Mansell, who was on shift that night.

It was an emotional visit, but one that helped to answer many questions the family had about the treatment Stefan received. Jack was able to see the helicopter and see how heavy some of the EAAA medical equipment is.

Jack has since received a community award, nominated by his school, for his awesomeness, resilience and planning the walk in memory of his dad. Jack has also since been nominated as "Young Person of the Year" at the Stars of Norfolk & Waveney Awards 2019. Good luck, Jack!

Wendy, Jack's mum, said:

Meeting Lisa has really helped both Jack and I so much. When Lisa visited I was able to talk about the evening I lost Stefan, how I felt that I hadn't been able to save him. I was also able to talk about Jack's idea.

Having Lisa and Ben there on the day was amazing. It meant so much to me that they wanted to be there for us. It was also so important for me to be able to meet the crew and to say thank you for all they did for Stefan.

doctors train to do their job? To become a pre-hospital emergency medicine (PHEM) doctor, there's a lot to learn. Most of our doctors have already had long careers working in the NHS, usually in the emergency department. Before they can start flying with EAAA, they have to undertake rigorous training programmes to provide them with the knowledge and practical skills they will need.

First, the doctors complete the National PHEM course with representatives from all the air ambulances in the UK. Then we provide a two-week more in-depth regional course in conjunction with Magpas Air Ambulance (MAGPAS) and Essex and Hertfordshire Air Ambulance (EHAAT), which brings all of the new PHEM doctors in the region together for further training.

This involves testing the trainees' knowledge and clinical skills in increasingly complex and challenging scenarios. Realistic simulations are one of the most effective forms of training for our doctors, and something they continually practice throughout their profession. This involves acting out a real-life case on a Training Resusci-Anne manikin and really puts the doctors through their paces.

This is the first year EHAAT have joined Magpas and EAAA on the regional course, and it was really beneficial to have so many experienced HEMS consultants working together and sharing their knowledge and skills. The new PHEM doctors then have four to six weeks of supervised shifts before being signed off to work independently with remote support from our duty consultants.



Video Laryngoscope.

EAAA always aims to ensure our crews are equipped with the most advanced and technologically capable equipment, to ensure we have as many resources available as possible to help save lives.

We have just upgraded to video laryngoscopes at both bases as part of our effective airway management tool kit. If a patient has problems breathing, this is a device which helps to secure their airway; it has a camera on one end which provides a link to a video screen, allowing both the doctor and CCP to see what is going on.

Cost: £1,000 per unit.

Paul and Jill are now looking forward to another Christmas together, thanks to EAAA.

Paul's definitely one of the only people we know who's needed our air ambulance twice within two weeks! In our book, that makes Paul a very, very lucky man.

In July of 2017, Paul suffered two cardiac events while at his home near Fakenham. The first was early on a Saturday morning. Paul and his wife, Jill, had been socialising the night before and at first Paul thought he just had indigestion. He got up to make a cup of tea and got back into bed. Minutes later, his breathing changed and then he stopped breathing and went into cardiac arrest. Jill quickly started performing CPR and called to her parents, who were staying that weekend, to dial 999.

An ambulance, rapid response vehicle and air ambulance were quickly dispatched. Jill did a fantastic job of continued resuscitation until more help reached them. The medical teams, including EAAA Doctor Tobias Gauss and Critical Care Paramedic Chris Neil, worked together to provide enhanced critical care, including using a LUCAS machine, which is a mechanical chest

compression device. They also administered medication to break down a blood clot, which can only be given by a doctor.

Once Paul was stable enough he was flown, with Iill, to the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. It would have taken over an hour to get there by road. Surgical teams identified the blocked blood vessel in Paul's heart and resolved it by inflating a small balloon. Paul was in intensive care for several days and in hospital for a week.

Just a few days after being home, Paul suffered another cardiac arrest following a second heart attack - 11 days after the first one. Jill had been out walking the dog when she returned to the house just as Paul collapsed. Again, Jill started performing CPR.

This time the cardiac arrest was a lot more serious as Paul was so weak. Luckily, when the air ambulance crew arrived it was the same doctor who had treated Paul before, Dr Tobias Gauss, with Critical Care Paramedic Tim Daniels. Knowing Paul's history, they were able to quickly recognise that Paul's artery had re-clotted.

It was incredibly difficult to treat Paul, his heart had been through so much and his veins had shut down, but the HEMS team did everything they could and fortunately stabilised Paul enough to fly him to hospital again.

Paul needed a stent, temporary pacemaker, then a permanent pacemaker and an ICD (internal defibrillator) fitted. Paul had a lot of



trouble maintaining his heart rate and every time it dropped he went into VF (an abnormal heart rhythm) and needed to be shocked again, which is why he needed the ICD. In total, Paul had 44 episodes of VF and was in hospital for a long time.

Eventually Paul returned home. It became clear that he would need a long time to recover, so he chose to retire early from work. He set himself achievable goals, like starting to drive again, getting fit enough to walk the dog then play cricket again. It's taken him a long time, but he now feels fit and confident again. After all they've been through, Paul and Jill are looking forward to a happy and healthy Christmas together and ahead to 2020.


aul's first cardiac arrest happened very early in the morning. As we're not currently operational 24/7 by helicopter, Paul was very lucky that we had just come online at 7am when we were tasked to him. The 999 call was made at 7:20 am. We were activated at 7:38 am and on scene 16 minutes later.

If Paul had collapsed just a few hours earlier, our night shift team would have responded to him by rapid response vehicle, providing the same care and equipment. However, Paul would have had to go to hospital in the road ambulance, taking up to an hour.



enny Cole came to see us in the summer to present us with a cheque for £27,000. This money has been generously left to EAAA by her long term partner, Barry, who sadly passed away last year aged 74.

Barry had been a successful country music singer in his heyday, with Jenny travelling with him all over the country. A few years ago Barry was diagnosed with a severe and untreatable neurological condition known as PSP, which stands for progressive supranuclear palsy. Currently there is no known cause of the disease or treatment.

During his illness, Barry spent a lot of time in hospital where he and Jenny would often see the yellow EAAA helicopter flying in and out of Norwich. They were already both very fond of the charity and the work it does, so when Barry decided to leave half of his estate to charity, he chose to leave both EAAA and the RNLI a lasting gift in his Will.

Jenny, who is keen a watcher of EAAA on Emergency Helicopter Medics and hopes to become an EAAA volunteer, said: "It




he nature of our operation means we often land at sites that have never seen a helicopter before. Downwash from the helicopter rotor poses a significant hazard which people often underestimate.

Downwash is the descending air accelerated through the rotor disk to generate lift. The downwash created by a helicopter is at its most powerful when in a hover. Our helicopters weigh around 3.5 tons and all that air that they push against to stay airborne has to go somewhere.

Helicopters can create a downwash capable of knocking someone off their feet or lifting a light aircraft. The speed of the air from the downwash can be greater than a gale force storm and can be very unpredictable.

Fences and garden furniture are highly susceptible to downwash but really anything loose in the landing or take-off area can get blown around and subsequently cause damage or injury. Our crews do their utmost to ensure that landing sites are clear and safe but sometimes, from the air, it is difficult to see smaller items which might pose a risk.


