WELCOME to lift Dff #65

Welcome to the first issue of Lift Off for 2023. Firstly, I would like to offer my heartfelt thanks for your continued support last year. You helped us attend over 2,500 life-threatening emergencies and be there for hundreds of people, and their families, when they needed us.

We're already three months into 2023, and our crews are currently being tasked to an average of nearly eight life-threatening emergencies a day. With the average cost of a mission standing at £3,750, your support is more vital than ever in helping us to continue delivering our life-saving service for 24 hours a day, every day of the year.

We have a busy few months ahead. You may have seen G-RESU, our Anglia One helicopter based at Norwich Airport, was fitted with its five-blade rotor last summer. G-HEMC, our Anglia Two helicopter based at Cambridge, has now gone off for its upgrade too. This means from May onwards both helicopters will be able to carry a higher payload of fuel and equipment and offer patients a smoother ride to hospital.

We'll also be welcoming two new rapid response vehicles (RRVs) in the next month or so, kitted out with all the latest equipment, to replace our older vehicles and help save even more lives. Our new RRVs will enable us to be more responsive to callouts during shift changes and when any of our vehicles are off the road for repair.

This year, we need to raise over £17m to continue to deliver and develop our service. With a turbulent economic climate, we will undoubtedly face fundraising challenges in the years ahead. To play my part, I've signed up to take on all of East Anglian Air Ambulance's flagship participation events in 2023. I'd love it if you could support or even join me! You can find out about some of our events on page 13 and there's more information on our website.

In this issue of Lift Off, we hear from a former patient who suffered a night-time cardiac arrest, from one of our critical care paramedics who has recently become a Consultant in Pre-Hospital Emergency Medicine and from our aviation expert, Alan Ward, answering some of the most common questions asked about our helicopter missions.

Finally, I want to say thank you for the difference you make in bringing hope to the many people who will need our life-saving care this year.

AIR AMBULANCE Paramedic one of only Three Nationally to gain Qualification

East Anglian Air Ambulance (EAAA) Critical Care Paramedic (CCP) Neil Flowers has become a Consultant in Pre-Hospital Emergency Medicine (PHEM) with the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh.

He is one of only three paramedics in the UK to be awarded this title.



Neil is now recognised as a Level 8 practitioner in PHEM by the Faculty of Pre-Hospital Care.

For Neil, this is recognition of a long career in PHEM, delivering consistently at the highest levels in Helicopter Emergency Medical Services across the East of England.

The qualification comes after five years of dedicated hard work, which included producing a portfolio of clinical and operational experience and showing proficiency equivalent to that of a consultant.

Alongside his duties as a CCP, Neil also holds the position of Head of Clinical Education and Research at East Anglian Air Ambulance, providing clinical leadership and leading on developments in clinical care, informing clinical education, and driving professional development. Thanks to your support EAAA crews treated 1,800 people in 2021-2022. That's five people a day who received the very best possible chance of survival in the face of the worst possible odds.

PATIENT STORY.

(hris Bergdahl

"Early intervention and (PR saves lives. It's really that simple."

Having awoken around 3am one February morning, 48-year-old father of two Chris Bergdahl assumed he was suffering from acid reflux. Making his way to the toilet, Chris suddenly became very unwell, collapsed on the bathroom floor and started to have a seizure. His wife Sue rushed to his aid and her quick thinking is one of the reasons he's still alive today.

At Helimed House the Anglia One night shift crew of Doctor Nick, Critical Care Paramedic Rod and Babcock pilots Gareth and Nick were assigned the mission, flying to the Bergdahls' home in Ipswich.



Doctor Nick said:

"In 2022 alone we attended 434 cardiac arrests, Chris being one of them. Unfortunately, survival rates for patients who don't receive early bystander CPR or defibrillation are incredibly low, so we know anytime the phone rings for a cardiac arrest mission, time is essential. Knowing Chris's wife had been able to give CPR increased his chances of survival and recovery."

Arriving on scene, the crew gave Chris a full assessment and provided critical care, ensuring he was stable and ready to transport to hospital.



Chris was flown to Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital for initial treatment before being transferred to Ipswich Hospital. Recovery hasn't been straightforward for Chris, suffering two strokes, a bleed on the brain and another cardiac arrest while in hospital. In total, Chris spent four weeks in a coma, six weeks in critical care and a further week on a ward.

Chris's wife Sue reflects on that night:

"It seems like so long ago now. It was strange, but I remember just being really calm. I think because the kids were there too I went into survival mode myself. Everything seemed to happen so quickly, from the moment Chris collapsed to the EEAST and EAAA crews arriving to driving to the hospital. I don't think I really comprehended what had happened and how serious the situation was."



LIFE IN RECOVERY

Nearly a year on from the incident Chris is recovering well and is enjoying spending quality time with his family, who we were delighted to welcome to Helimed House recently.

Chris shared:

"When I look back now, I realise how different the outcome could have been if Sue hadn't performed CPR straight away, I am extremely lucky to be here today. I strongly urge everyone to take part in some form of CPR and defibrillator training: you never know when someone close to you might need your help."

AVIATION AREA Ask Alan!

We caught up with our resident aviation expert, Alan Ward, to answer some of your top helicopter questions!

The crew never know where they may be called to – how do they work out where it's safe to land?

When a HEMS mission comes in, the crew are given a six-figure grid reference which can then be plotted on a map, giving the crew the first chance to consider the suitability of the location. The crew uses electronic mapping via an iPad which is also 3G enabled and can be used on the way to a job, so one of the pilots can have a look on Google Earth and review the satellite imagery. A lot of places now have Google Street view images and we can also review these, if available.



While this is all very useful, nothing replaces doing a full 'recce' of the landing site once the helicopter is overhead, to assess the suitability of the landing site. At night the 'recce' takes longer, because it can be harder to identify any potential hazards to landing. At night, we also have an impressive array of landing lights on the helicopter, the pilots wear night vision goggles, and the clinical team also use night vision monocles to look out from the rear of the helicopter. All these things help us make sure it is safe to land.



How are you finding the night-time flying challenges and what are you doing to ensure they remain safe?

By its very nature, flying at night is challenging and the pilots maintain a rigorous training regime to ensure they keep up with their night flying skills. One of the ways we are doing this is by the use of night training landing sites within the Eastern region, and crews will conduct training flights to these sites on a regular basis. Even when training, the clinical team are on board and we are on call at a moment's notice to respond should a HEMS mission be received whilst airborne.



What are the hardest places to land the helicopter?

Some of the hardest places to land are in the middle of a town or city. There are a multitude of things to consider such as the size of a potential site and what is surrounding it. The helicopter has quite a strong downwash and we want to ensure that, where possible, we don't cause damage to people's property. We also need to consider what access the clinical team have in terms of getting out of the helicopter and getting to the patient as quickly as possible. Thankfully the Eastern region is pretty flat, so we don't have too much terrain to think about!



Help save lives in East Anglia

Judith Legge was working on her family farm when a routine task turned into a lifethreatening situation. Having walked out into the yard to give some potato labels to a lorry driver, she was hit by a forklift.

The impact caused horrific injuries, stripping Judith's stomach of skin and fat, badly damaging her left kidney and urethra, breaking her arm and dislocating her shoulder. Judith was attended to by Anglia Two crew Doctor Jon, Critical Care Paramedic Liam and Pilots Matthew and Paul.

Thankfully, due to the care that was provided that day, Judith made a full recovery.

What does this title mean?

A Consultant Practitioner in PHEM, is a sub-speciality of emergency medicine, anaesthesia and intensive care medicine.

The title means I am recognised as a Level 8 practitioner in PHEM by the Faculty of Pre-Hospital Care. It took five years of hard work and a portfolio of clinical and operational experience to show that my experience and proficiency are equivalent to that of a consultant.



What's in your cup?

I have coffee in the morning and tea in the afternoon. Generally, no more than one of each per day, both with milk and two sugars.

I am mostly looking forward to the warmer weather and working in my garden!
